Constance E. Quinn was born November 4, 1934 to Omega and Margaret (Caldwell) Lytle in Morganton, North Carolina. Due to her mother's early death, she was raised by her two aunts and uncles, Minerva (Paul) Taylor and near brother cousin Robert Lytle, Kingsport, Tennessee and Thelma (James) Hamilton, Toledo, Ohio.

She attended Douglas High School in Tennessee and attended Fisk University. In her youth, Connie played piano and organ numerous hours for her family church and was majorette for her high school marching band.
